A SUMMER OF ARCHAEOLOGY

With excavation starting at the National Herb Centre on June 1st and our fourth year of involvement with the Festival of British Archaeology, this season is shaping up to be our busiest yet.

With two qualified archaeologists at the helm, and the addition of experienced workers from the Feldon Society, we should be able to get our clearest picture yet of the historic context of this site. And with the generous donation of a caravan by Karin Castle, there will now be a dry shelter for finds processing (and tea breaks!) to be done in tandem with the excavation.

Lead archaeologist David Freke explained: "We will continue the exploration of the Roman farm buildings we have been uncovering since 2008, and to get to the bottom of the 'temple' site, literally, to find out what is in the large pit beneath the wall of the Roman building. We will also open a new trench nearby to investigate the large bank and ditch revealed in David Sabin's 2012 geophysical survey – prehistoric? Roman? Saxon? Watch this space! And hope for better weather than last year."

And on Sunday, July 21st, the Heritage Group will welcome in the public to an archaeology open day at the National Herb Centre. Featuring a timeline of exhibits from the wider local area, this will display finds and artefacts from the earliest inhabitants through to the present day. It will also highlight the fantastic work being done by other local groups and individuals to keep our local history alive.

VISIT TO SHIPSTON-ON-STOUR The WHG walk and talk will be to Shipston-on-Stour on Monday, June 10th, meeting at the fascinating museum on Telegraph Street at 6.30pm. The evening will include a tour of the museum, a walk around Shipston and finish in a local hostelry.

This ancient market town, which was part of Worcestershire until the 20th century, was first recorded in c770 and was long a possession of Worcester Priory. Shipston's name references the sheep washing on the Stour.
