1.Thomas Bennet was a yeoman farmer in Warmington and an elderly man in 1713 when he drew up his will (*see abstract of his will, following*). *He* had married, first, Mary Judd, who died at the age of 41, leaving two sons and three daughters (*information from her gravestone*). Mary was the daughter of another Warmington yeoman farmer, Richard Judd. The Judd homestead is at the south-west corner of the Green, now divided into the properties known as Sunny Cottage and Carpenter's Cottage. Thomas Bennet was assessed on three hearths in the Hearth Tax of 1670, the same number as his first father-in-law.

Thomas re-married late in life, his wife Martha being the widow of Richard Rose (died 1698), yet another of Warmington's yeoman farmers. Thomas's will mentions his wife Martha, two daughters of his first marriage and their husbands, and twelve grandchildren. It is probable that his other children predeceased him. His will left cash legacies to his widow and daughters, and appointed trustees to sell his real and personal estate to provide legacies equally distributed among the twelve grandchildren. Following a not infrequent practice in Warmington, it seems likely that Thomas Bennet's real estate, his farm house and land, was purchased by one of his sons-in-law. Manorial records show the next occupier as John Davis.

2. Some notes on the sale of Thomas Bennet's goods

Thomas's will appointed his four executors to act as trustees to sell his goods. The executors of a will (or the next of kin of someone dying intestate) were required to draw up an inventory of the goods and chattels of the deceased. Many inventories do not survive, although a hundred or more have been discovered for Warmington folk of the seventeenth and early eighteenth centuries, some full of interesting detail. Thomas Bennet's inventory is rare, in that it not only lists his possessions minutely, but also gives their market value and the *names of their purchasers*, most of whom lived in the village.

Some of the purchasers, and what they bought.

There are many social nuances in the way purchasers were listed which are difficult for us to comprehend! **The women** were listed in various ways. Widdow Gascoigne was plainly a widow. The testator's widow was the only one graced with the title Mrs., even the wife of the lord of the manor appearing as Mary Thorp Knight. The testator's daughter heads the list of purchasers as plain Mary Davis. Some married women were given as Goody Turner, Goody Keeling and so on, a shortened form of goodwife. Cath Astel, who bought a spoon for a penny, is likely to be the woman of that name who died in 1744 'an ancient maid', according to the parish register. Clearly not all married women and spinsters were here differentiated. **Of the men**, a few are described as Old Gyles, Old Pinchbeck - one wonders, how old? Perhaps merely to distinguish them from their sons. A few men were styled Mr. including the rector, Mr Gilpin, and Mr Claridge of Grove Farm, newly risen from 'yeoman' to 'gentleman', according to other documentary sources.

Some purchasers bought items clearly useful to their **occupations**, (information on occupations from the parish register and from wills). The blacksmith, John Jarret, bought a pair of scales, 60 pounds of iron, and leaden weights. Richard Tombs, a mason, bought a grindstone. An old crib to carry hay in, the drays, a cart, horse ties and so on were bought by various farmers. Richard Legg was a maltster and he bought the furnace for £3 and the old malt mill for two shillings. Anthony Buckby, a carpenter, spent 11s. on wood. John Ketch was a weaver, so the old wheels he bought may well have been spinning wheels to occupy his five daughters. Richard Davis Knight, lord of the manor, spent 5s. 7d. on copings, capstones and paving stones one wonders where around the manor house he put them!

Thomas Bennet had an orchard, as shown by the many sales of apples. A strike of apples cost ten pence, half a strike five pence and a peck two pence halfpenny. Goody Gyles bought three gallons at three pence three farthings. These prices seem to prove that the Warmington 'strike' was the standard bushel. 1 bushel = 4 pecks = 8 gallons.

5.A glossary of the terms used in the sale details

- 1. Furz furze, gorse, an important fuel, especially for poor folk & for bakers' ovens
- 2. **Kid -** faggot

Peter Goodwin

- 3. **Halm** straw for thatching
- 4. **Kiver** shallow wooden tub
- 5. Cieve sieve
- 6. Maire & Holter mare and halter
- 7. Skillet long-handled pan, with feet, used for cooking on an open fire
- 8. **Peel** long-handled, flat-bladed implement, used in bread baking
- 9. **Trenchers** plates, probably wooden
- 10. A Wanscoat Chair a wainscot, or panelled, chair
- 11. **Flasket** oval tub for washing clothes *or* a shallow basket *or* a small flask
- 12. **Poringer** small basin
- 13. Parsers drills for boring holes
- 14. Jack Spit device for turning a spit
- 15. Handborrow & skrine handbarrow & screen
- 16. **Joynt Stooles -** stools made by a joiner
- 17. Chaving dish chafing dish, placed on a chaffer (brazier) to heat food
- 18. 500 & a half of Cole five and a half hundredweight of coal
- 19. **skiming dish** used in skimming cream
- 20. 30 pounds of pewter probably dishes, plates, etc., here valued by weight
- 21. a flake & a stone for sharpening blades?
- 22. **stocking ax** an axe for forestry work

- 23. **Tuning Horn** probably a funnel, here made from horn, for filling a cask or tun; *or* possibly a forerunner of the tuning fork
- 24. a pair of old Bellows boards the wooden sides of a pair of bellows
- 25. cockers leggings

- 40. old Wheeles probably spinning wheels
- 41. ye fan a fan, basket or shovel used for winnowing the chaff from the grain
- 42. a Scythe sned the haft or handle of a scythe
- 43. an Old stell a stand for a barrel or tub
