

WHG members were impressed by the well-equipped, modern museum which boasted a large collection of complete Samian ware and contained many intriguing artifacts - one favourite was a tap in the shape of a man's thumb. Our walk around Alcester was ably led by Trevor Wraight from the town's civic society who enlivened the trip with many interesting tales.

Highlights included the early 17th century market hall, the beautiful timber-framed housing and tracing the needle-making heritage of the town through its buildings. A tasty and reasonably-priced meal at the Swan (a historic coaching inn) was an additional bonus. Altogether a very enjoyable, informative and (mainly) dry day.

Other names for similar features are ginnel, jitty, snicket, tink-a-tank and twitchel. Few of these words appear in a standard dictionary.

In Alcester the burgage plots down the High Street were planned and laid out at a standard width. They would have typically combined a shop front, work room, living accommodation and yard behind leading to a back lane. At intervals, between burgage plots, there would be a tuery for pedestrians, pack animals and small carts.
